#### Huron Valley Numismatic Society (HVNS) Program Chair Handbook

I. What are the responsibilities of the HVNS Program Chair?

The objective of the HVNS is to encourage and disperse numismatic knowledge to collectors and those interested in becoming collectors and cultivating fraternity among members. Consistent with this objective, the Program Chair:

- A. Arranges for the program portion of the agenda for club meetings (see Appendix A for examples)
- B. Attends, provides reports, and participates in discussion and decision-making at the Board of Directors meetings.
- II. How is the Program Budget established?

At the first Board of Directors meeting of the year, the Program Chair asks the Board of Directors to approve a Program Budget.

For example:

Honorariums for 8 presenters @ \$25	\$200
Supplies, e.g., handouts and projector equipment	\$100
TOTAL PROGRAM BUDGET	\$300

III. What is the Program portion of the meeting agenda?

The Program is an approximately 30 minute portion of the agenda. It usually consists of a presentation, but may also be a discussion, a

video, or another activity consistent with the HVNS objective, e.g., a Members Bourse (see Appendix B).

IV. How does the Program Chair select topics and find presenters?

The Program Chair should strive to understand the interests of the HVNS members across various areas of numismatics including U.S. coins, world coins, paper money, exonumia, errors/varieties and grading. Presentation topics should be balanced during the course of the year to minimize repetition of topics in subsequent months as much as practical. In order to accomplish this, the program chair should:

- A. Asking members for ideas on topics and presenters which may include a formal membership survey as well as informal conversations with members.
- B. Encouraging club members to give a presentation on a topic in their numismatic area of interest.
- C. Reading articles in the Michigan State Numismatic Society (MSNS) journal <u>The Michmatist</u> and considering authors as potential presenters
- D. Contacting Program Chairs of other clubs for ideas on topics and presenters (The contact persons for many other clubs can be found in the "MSNS Member Club Meetings" section of The Michmatist and in the linked clubs section on the MSNS web site.)
- E. Asking the MSNS Educational Forum Chair and the Central States Numismatic Society (CSNS) Education Director for ideas on topics, presenters, and funding. (See the MSNS and CSNS web sites.) Note: CSNS will reimburse member clubs up to \$200

per year for speakers. Contact the CSNS Education Director for details.

- F. Reviewing the programs conducted, and the exhibits presented at other coin shows, including the MSNS Spring and Fall Conventions, for topics which would be of interest to HVNS members.
- IV. What equipment does HVNS have?
  - A. HVNS owns a BENQ Model MS510 Digital Projector and an assortment of connecting cables for laptop computers.
    (Currently, connecting our projector to a PC is easy, but connecting to a Mac is a little more difficult.)
  - B. The current meeting site, the Highland Adult Activity Center in Highland, MI, has a screen as well as a television with a DVD player.
- V. What does the Program Chair provide for the presenters?

The Program Chair:

- Provides the presenters with information about the club meeting
   including the location, driving directions, starting time, and a reminder a week before the meeting
- Provides the audio-visual equipment the presenters need, e.g., a projector and screen, a laptop computer that will take his/her
  CD or thumb drive, and photocopies of handouts
- C. Welcomes the presenter and introduces him/her

- D. Gives the presenters (except for club members) an honorarium (see Section II above)
- E. Sends the presenter a thank you note following the presentation.
- VII What else does the program Chair do?

The Program Chair:

- A. Notifies the web master of programs and presenters as they are confirmed so (s)he can post them on the club web site
- B. Schedules programs and presenters through February of the year after his/her term of office ends to give his/her successor time to make the transition
- C. Knows how to operate and do basic troubleshooting for the HVNS projector and the television and DVD machine at the meeting site
- D. Keeps the list of presenters (see below) current and sends a copy to the club Historian (Board of Directors – Seat 3) at the end of the year
